



Mashudu Nevhutalu

GAUTENG

Mashudu Nevhutalu is a Johannesburg-based contemporary artist whose work explores nostalgia, memory, and shared cultural experience. A graduate of Tshwane University of Technology with a degree in Fine and Applied Arts, he reimagines faded family photographs through large-scale paintings rich in vibrant colours.

Transforming sepia-toned memories into luminous, emotionally resonant scenes, Nevhutalu's work preserves personal intimacy while reflecting collective histories—particularly within Black communities. His paintings often depict family gatherings, weddings, and everyday moments, inviting viewers to connect with their own lived experiences.

His work has been exhibited at Turbine Art Fair, FNB Art Joburg, Investec Cape Town Art Fair, RMB Latitudes, BKhz Gallery, 99 Loop, Art Source SA, Afronova, and MISA Art (Germany), and is held in private collections both locally and internationally.

Treasure Mlima

KWAZULU NATAL

Treasure Mlima (b. 1999, Durban, South Africa) is a self-taught visual artist whose work explores the fluidity of identity through a blend of minimalism and expressionism. Influenced by his multicultural upbringing and background in Architectural Draughting, Mlima centres the human body as a vessel for introspection, caught in moments of transition and transformation.

Working primarily in wood, he carves sculptural narratives that blur the line between abstraction and surrealism, evoking stillness and quiet intensity.

His work has been exhibited both locally and internationally, including Gordon Gallery, Fresh Paint Art Fair, RMB Latitudes, and the Cassirer Welz Award (Finalist). His 2023 solo at Gordon Gallery marked a milestone in his rising career. Mlima's work is held in major collections, including the Serge Tiroche Contemporary Collection and the JSE Collection.

Thapo Sekoaila



Thabo Sekoaila (b. 1980, Polokwane, South Africa) is an artist and curator based in Springs, east of Johannesburg. He holds a National Diploma in Fine Arts and a BTech in Fine Art (Sculpture) from Wits Technikon.

Sekoaila's practice explores themes of African identity, cultural legacy, and transformation, engaging with contemporary South African narratives as an artist, curator, mentor, and exhibitions designer. Working in various mediums on canvas and paper, his textured, multidimensional works feature stylised human figures surrounded by etched inscriptions—evoking a sense of emotional depth, historical struggle, and future hope.

His work reflects a deep commitment to redefining African experience through visual storytelling that connects personal and collective memory.

EASTERN CAPE


Maryna Joubert is a multidisciplinary artist based in Jeffreys Bay, South Africa, whose practice explores themes of ecological fragility, consumption, and memory. Working mediums, she transforms discarded and found materials into contemplative works that merge hand-stitching with symbolic debris—creating quiet yet critical reflections on life in the Anthropocene.

Rooted in a deep respect for nature shaped by her rural upbringing, her work is a form of ecological storytelling—mapping personal histories within broader planetary concerns.

She holds a Fine Arts degree from UNISA and a Master's in Practical Theology focused on art and ecology. With over 25 years of experience in ceramic education, she now curates and hosts exhibitions at her home gallery, Kuns Plek / Art Spot and has completed multiple residencies at the Cité internationale des arts in Paris.

Samantha Maseko

Samantha Impumelelo Maseko born in Mpumalanga and based in Johannesburg is a 2020 graduate of Artist Proof Studio's printmaking programme. She works across oil painting, collage, assemblage, mixed media, and printmaking to explore Black femininity, identity, self-representation, and transformation.

Her work embraces raw materials and resists a fixed style, allowing each piece to speak its own language. Using fabrics from her mother's clothes, lace, textured surfaces, butterflies, and burn marks, Maseko preserves memory and legacy while honouring the individuality of women's stories. Her art celebrates resilience, questions intimacy, and reclaims worth in a world that often seeks to diminish it.

At the core of her practice is the belief that women are more than the roles assigned to them—they are the authors of their own stories.

Naledi Satekge



As a trans woman, Naledi explores the intersections of identity, belonging, and womanhood through photography that blends documentary realism with poetic sensibility. Her multidisciplinary practice—spanning film, photography, poetry, and design—amplifies under represented voices and challenges societal norms.

Her work seeks not only to capture moments but to spark empathy, shift perspectives, and celebrate the strength and beauty of the human spirit.

MPUMALANGA


Thembz (they/them) is a visual artist from eMalahleni whose practice navigates the personal archive through the lens of Black queer* experience in South African township life. Their work explores memory, identity, and place, often reflecting on the complexities of visibility and belonging.

They hold a BA in Fine Arts and English Literature from the University of Pretoria, a dual focus that informs both the visual and written language within their archival explorations.

Thembz's practice weaves together storytelling, reflection, and critical inquiry to create space for nuanced representations of queer identity in contemporary South Africa.

Leonard Baloyi

Leonard Baloyi (b. 1992, Soweto, South Africa) is a self-taught visual artist known for his poignant and introspective portraits that explore the complexities of everyday life and human emotion. Working with oils, acrylics, pastels, and charcoal, Baloyi creates deeply personal yet universally relatable works that blend portraiture and human figures.

His art delves into themes of identity, emotion, and the loss of empathy in modern society, often using vibrant and ironic elements to invite reflection on the human condition. Notably, he contributed to the development of the Baragwanath public facility and traders market in 2005 and was a top 100 finalist in the Thami Mnyele Fine Arts Awards in 2017.

Based in Johannesburg, Baloyi continues to exhibit widely across South Africa, engaging audiences with his thought-provoking visual narratives.

Austin Kudzaishe Mandlokuwa, known as KREOTA, is a versatile contemporary artist whose work blends diverse techniques, styles, and ideas to create deeply introspective and emotionally resonant pieces. His art invites viewers to explore and interpret each work individually, offering a space for personal reflection and connection.

Central to KREOTA's work is the human face, used as a powerful symbol to express mood, memory, and the inner workings of the conscious and unconscious mind. His vibrant color palettes and layered compositions result in art that is both visually striking and thought-provoking.

Drawing from both personal experience and broader contemporary themes, KREOTA creates art that is not only aesthetically engaging but also encourages self-discovery and emotional awareness.

Samson Chambala

Samson C. Chambala is a Mozambican-born, Johannesburg-based artist whose work explores powerful themes of identity, migration, and inequality. Born in Matola during a time of civil unrest, and later moved to South Africa, Samson's personal experiences with xenophobia, discrimination, and cultural dislocation deeply inform his artistic voice.


Blending elements of fashion, fine art, and social commentary, his practice features layered expressionist paintings created with acrylics, textiles, cotton wool, and collage. His bold visual language critiques current social issues faced by young Black Africans, while reflecting on Africa's past and present.

Samson draws inspiration from portraiture and surrealism and his recent work delves into identity displacement in African history, using mixed media to expand the storytelling potential of his art and provoke difficult, necessary conversations.


